40	Opening Remarks and Pledge of Allegiance: Councilmember Okelberry opened the meeting							
41	with a thought on separation of church and state. Our founding fathers were seeking to protect our							
42	religious freedom. Councilmember Smith led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance.							
43	Adoption of Previous Minutes and Agenda: Minutes of the March 10, 2015 Council Meeting

Councilmember Clausen moved to "adopt the minutes of the March 10, 2015 Council Meeting, and the evening's revised agenda." Council member Okelberry seconded the motion, which passed with Clausen, Okelberry, Smith, Wilson and Wright in favor. No one opposed.

Pay Bills: The bills were presented and discussed.

Councilmember Wilson moved to "pay the bills as listed." Councilmember Clausen seconded the motion, which passed with Clausen, Okelberry, Smith, Wilson and Wright in favor. No one opposed.

<u>Finance Director Report:</u> In the absence of FD Grover, Treasurer Wilker explained the discrepancy in the Cache Clearing Account, which was brought up at the last meeting. The problem will resolve itself after March is closed and we roll into April.

<u>Purchase Requisition Requests:</u> There was none.

<u>Public Works Report and Discussion:</u> PWD Nelson reported on the following:

- They've been working on sewer inspections, which they do once a year. They've been using the camera, which has been helpful on a number of occasions. There are five manholes that have infiltration coming in. He'd like to have Val Kotter and Sons come and inject a product into the line to stop the leaks. They can't give us a specific price until they see how much product they need to use. They said a high guess would be \$5,000. There is only \$2,000 budgeted in Repairs and Maintenance. Councilmember Clausen gave his approval for having this done.
- They have been trimming trees so they won't continue to hit the snowplows.
- He is working through the lighting ordinance with Engineer Rasmussen. He hopes it gets figured out soon so the city can get lights installed in Saddlerock Phase One.
- He has been working with Dan Hogan on his punchlist for Phase One, so he can move forward to his next phase. Councilmember Clausen asked if Mr. Hogan is planning to fix 600 South where the sewer settled. Mr. Nelson said it is on the punchlist and will be replaced.
- The green waste bin is available now for residential use.

Administrative Report: Recorder Lind remembered the city agreed not to approve Dan Hogan's subsequent phases until Phase One of Sadderock was completed and signed off by the engineer. Mr. Hogan is starting to apply for Phase Two. She wondered if she should schedule him on the Planning Commission agenda since he isn't finished with Phase One. The Council agreed he can get the Commission's approval, but, the Council will not give theirs until Phase One is finished.

<u>Public Comment:</u> James McWhorter introduced himself as the person who runs the strings academy program at the elementary schools. Mayor Brackner assured he would call on him to speak during the Old Church discussion.

Discuss a Fence Variance for Tony Smith: Postponed.

<u>Discuss the Future of the Old Church:</u> Mayor Brackner explained the Council is concerned with how the Old Church building looks. It is in need of repair. They are also interested in the property for extra park space for families to use. Mr. Griffin addressed the Council. He said the Utah Festival Opera and Theater Company have been using the building for about 15 years. It is very important to them. He discussed the productions their company puts on and how much it benefits Cache Valley. The Old Church facility gives them a place to design their scenery. They can't find anywhere else that has a big gym floor. They also have large collections of tapes, costumes and string instruments that are stored and repaired there. Kyle Stein also resides in the building as a caretaker. They are willing to do more maintenance on the building if the city desires.

James McWhorter, director of the elementary string program, said they have raised a lot of money to buy instruments. They are grateful for this building as a place to store them. It is one of the

pillars that have made their program possible. They are hoping the Council would allow the building to remain. If they have to pay rent somewhere, it would take money away from the children.

Curtis Knight discussed the strings program. It has been a great program in the schools. It gives the children confidence, as does sports, which is extremely good for the community.

The artistic director of the Unicorn Theater explained they are a non-profit organization. They are grateful to be able to use this space to help them to build scenery for their productions.

Mayor Brackner said it's great the opera company is bringing revenue into the valley, but River Heights gets very little, if any, of it.

Councilmember Wilson asked how the strings program is set up. Corrine Knight said they are a non-profit organization, hired by the school district.

Councilmember Okelberry said he's worried about the safety in the building. Gary Griffin explained there can't be more than 3-4 people in there at a time. The asbestos has been evaluated by an inspector. It's fine as long as it's not disturbed.

Mayor Brackner said he understands Wellsville Elementary will be vacated when the new high schools are built. Would it be possible for them to use this building? Gary Griffin said they have discussed it but it is very iffy right now.

Councilmember Clausen said the building's appearance is starting to bother them. The roof, trim and brickwork are in need of repair. Inside is a safety concern. Gary Griffin said they would be hard pressed to spend \$50,000 for a new roof and then have the city tear it down. They would consider maintenance expenses if they had a long term contract. The structural security of the building was discussed. They decided it would be best to have an expert look at it.

Councilmember Okelberry asked if the county was willing to fund a portion of the upkeep, and would the opera company be willing to share the building space. Gary Griffin said they would consider it, but they really need the gym floor.

Councilmember Clausen asked if the Council could think about this and have it on another agenda for further discussion.

Councilmember Okelberry said they appreciate the Opera, Unicorn Theater and the string program as being a benefit to the community.

Councilmember Wilson asked how many people live there. Kyle Stein said he's the only one. Mayor Brackner asked that the old car be removed. Mr. Stein agreed.

Councilmember Wilson asked if any of these groups or individuals pay rent. She was told the Opera Company pays the city \$1/year. None of the others pay to use the building.

Councilmember Okelberry suggested the Council discuss this at their next meeting. He asked, if the Council decides they can't keep the building open, how much time would they need to vacate. Gary Griffin said the least amount of time would be 180 days, as stated in their contract.

Mayor Brackner thanked them for coming.

<u>Review Capital Project Prioritization:</u> Mayor Brackner handed out a revised list of capital projects and discussed each one.

Pave city driveway from 500 East to end of tennis courts: The cost is projected at \$14,000. The addition of a sewer line would add another \$10,000 - 15,000.

Sidewalks - ADA compliant: Councilmember Wilson said she ranked this low since she understands they will be updated as roads are replaced.

Roof on office building: Councilmember Okelberry asked the difference between metal and shingles. PWD Nelson said metal hasn't come up with the companies that have submitted bids. Councilmember Wilson feels the roof should be extended to cover the basement stairs, which is not

included in the estimate. The council generally didn't support a metal roof. They would rather have shingles.

Looping of the 700 South water line: This will provide the volume of water needed in the commercial area.

Seal streets in Saddlerock Phase One: This has already been agreed on.

Smooth 600 East: Mayor Brackner discussed the different options, which are repair or replace. The cost would be between \$80,000 and \$225,000, depending on how in-depth it was. The first option is to remove the patches and smooth the low spots before repaving the patches. This should cost about \$40,000 for the section from River Heights Blvd to 400 South and another \$40,000 for the section from 400 South to 600 South. The second option is to grind up the two middle lanes and add some tar to the removed asphalt and repave the same lanes with the old asphalt. This should cost about \$80,000 for each section listed above. The third option is to replace the street with new construction (which includes replacing the soft topsoil with a road base) of curbs, gutters, sidewalks, and paved street. This should cost about \$225,000 for each of the two sections of 600 East. PWD Nelson has discussed this with Holbrook Asphalt. They said anytime the asphalt is cut, you are setting up for more deterioration. He feels a rough road next to the park isn't a bad thing – it slows cars down. Councilmember Clausen is in favor of spending \$225,000 on the top section. Mayor Brackner will relist this as two projects at \$225,000 each.

Park property on the brow of the hill: Councilmember Wright hopes to acquire this for no cost, but doesn't know yet. Councilmember Okelberry suggested not having it on the list if there's no cost. They agreed.

Remove old church: Mayor Brackner asked if the council would be willing to let the tenants stay long term if they took care of upkeep. (Long term to them is probably 20 years.) PWD Nelson said once they fix some things, other things may come to light, such as the structure of the roof when they start to replace shingles. Councilmember Wilson realizes the building is of great use to the renters but doesn't feel they would cease to function without it.

700 South: Councilmember Smith suggested putting \$50,000/year away until they have enough to do the whole project. PWD Nelson suggested doing a block at a time since there are going to be easement issues. Councilmember Clausen reminded there are so many issues with 700 South. Some property owners own out into the road. Mayor Brackner will refigure this projects, based on 'what ifs.'

History: Council wasn't too interested.

Mayor Brackner will revise the list and send it out again. He asked that they return their ranking to him right away so he can get the revisions made before the next meeting. He reminded that they can spend about \$700,000 in the next few years, which would keep a \$500,000 balance. Councilmember Wright would like to keep \$750,000 in the reserve.

Councilmember Wright asked about the LTAP report (road maintenance) that was done under Mayor Baker. He felt they should look at the recommendations given through this study. PWD Nelson said it is a good program. It gets bumped off schedule when a water line needs to be replaced. He still looks at their recommendations. The cost for the study was \$2,500; he feels it was worth the money. Their top suggestions are already on the list for consideration. Mayor Brackner will review the report.

<u>Mayor Brackner and Council report:</u> Councilmember Smith said the additional dumpsters will be available April 1. Residents will be asked to clean up their yards during April so River Heights will look nice. The royalty has been chosen and will be presented to the council in one month.

Councilmember Okelberry asked Councilmember Smith if he ever got his email set up. They will work on it tonight. He will add the newsletter information to the website.

Councilmember Clausen reported 5 or 6 mayors are continuing to meet together on the wastewater and no decision has been made yet.

Councilmember Wilson said t-ball sign-ups begin April 1.

Councilmember Wright reported that the Commission heard from some solar experts at their last meeting. They suggested a helpful website that will be a good start and are willing to help us fine tune a solar ordinance that will work for River Heights. Mayor Brackner asked if Conservice would comply with the new ordinance. Mr. Wright said they most likely would. Since it's not in place yet, they don't have to follow it.

Mayor Brackner said he has received a letter from BRAG. They are having a workshop to discuss grants on April 9. He asked if anyone would go. Councilmember Clausen said they have gone before and found River Heights doesn't qualify for any grants, just loans.

Mayor Brackner said Rex Davidsavor has turned in his resignation from the planning commission since he has moved. Therefore, he needs to be replaced. Councilmember Wright said Mark Malmstrom is willing to serve and would be an excellent choice. He served on the planning commission in Providence for 3 years. Mayor Brackner said Kerry Coleman said he would consider serving. In the fall, Commissioner Royle's term will be up. Commissioner Petersen's term was up in February. Mr. Wright will ask him if he is willing to stay on for another term. The council approved Mark Malmstrom for now.
