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39	The River Heights City Council met at 6:30 p.m. in the Ervin R. Crosbie Council Chambers in							
40	the River Heights City Building on Tuesday, March 12, 2019 for their regular council meeting.							
41	Opening Remarks and Pledge of Allegiance: Councilmember Thatcher opened the meeting							
42	with a thought and Councilmember Scott led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance.							
43	Adoption of Previous Minutes and Agenda: Minutes for the February 26, 2019 meeting were							
44	reviewed.							

Councilmember Thatcher moved to "adopt the minutes of the council meeting of February 26, 2019 and the evening's agenda." Councilmember Scott seconded the motion, which passed with Clausen, Scott, Thatcher and Wilson in favor. Wright was absent. No one opposed.

Reports and Approval of Payments (Mayor, Council, Staff):

Public Works Director Nelson

- He went to training in St. George and attended classes put on by the Division of Drinking Water
- They are cleaning up and reconstructing the shop to be able to store more equipment.
- He hasn't heard when the new pick up will be available, he's guessing it will be soon.
- Councilmember Clausen discussed ordering a snowplow and sander and selling the orange truck. Mr. Nelson has checked on the value of the orange truck and found it's worth between \$5,000 and \$8,000. He suggested putting it out for bid for two weeks. If it hasn't sold in this time, sell it outright. The council was okay with setting a low bid of \$5,000. He'll get it out for bid soon. A sander and plow will cost less money now, compared to waiting for fall.
- They have done a walkthrough on the 700 South sidewalk project. The contractors have a few more things they need to fix. Drainage seems better than its ever been. There are only a couple muddy spots with the rain, which they will probably dig out and fill in with gravel. The contractor will take care of fixing the areas included in their contract. The city will continue to fill in holes with gravel for about a year, at which time it will become the responsibility of the homeowners.

Finance Director Grover was absent.

Treasurer Wilker

• Ms. Wilker explained the Rocky Mountain Power bill includes a credit of \$400, due to an energy saver credit the city received.

Councilmember Clausen moved to "pay the bills as listed." Councilmember Scott seconded the motion, which passed with Clausen, Scott, Thatcher and Wilson in favor. Wright was absent. No one opposed.

Councilmember Thatcher

- The city received one application for ambassadors. She sent a notice out to the high schools and expects to get more applications from this additional announcement.
- The city has been invited to participate in a south valley talent show and has been asked to recommend citizens who could represent River Heights in a tryout. She asked for nominations. Councilmember Wilson recommended Aidan Ames and will have other names later. Ms. Thatcher suggested the Rhodes.

Councilmember Scott

• On April 16 there will be an emergency preparedness fair going on at the church. He will set up a city booth and hand out emergency flags. The young women can make more if needed. He will man the booth and answer questions in behalf of the city.

Councilmember Clausen

He has been approached by a couple members of the Lions Club, who informed him that the Apple Days committee has told them they are considering having food trucks for the event, rather than the Lions serve a dinner. Without this event the Lions won't be able to exist because they are struggling as it is. Councilmember Wilson felt the city should allow them to do the dinner. Mayor Rasmussen stated it is Councilmember Thatcher's decision since she is over Apple Days. Ms. Wilson gave a history of the Apple Days dinner. It was a hassle to organize it so they asked the Lions Club to take it over and it took the worry out of the meal. PWD Nelson said he heard from several people last year that the food wasn't cooked very well. He also heard that there weren't options for kids. Mr. Clausen said their menu does allow alacart and they have hot dogs available. Mayor Rasmussen said this decision is an administrative function. When the council second guesses decisions based on another's assignments then those assignments don't carry the same weight as they started with. Recorder Lind said Jim Brackner (of the Lions) has appealed to her and given her all the same information Mr. Clausen received. As chair of Apple Days, she is not interested in being the reason the Lions Club dissolves. She and Councilmember Thatcher will meet and discuss the best way to handle the issue.

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Councilmember Wilson

- T-Ball sign-ups will be starting April 1.
- The fields are still too muddy for soccer. The porta-potty will be delivered the first of April.

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Councilmember Wright was absent.

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Recorder Lind

• She ordered an outdoor movie screen from Camp Chef, who offered a 40% discount. It was delivered in less than a week! The total cost was \$288, with a savings of \$160. It will be paid for from the administrative budget.

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Mayor Rasmussen

- He asked all to look at their budgets to decide what they need for the next fiscal year. He suggested cutting back in areas that are usually not spent. He asked them to have their budgets ready by April 15, at which time he will set up a meeting with each of them to go over their figures.
- PWD Nelson said he learned more about impact fees at his recent training. The fees are not easy for cities to spend unless there is a big development. One or two home's impact fees don't bring in enough to cover an approved impact fee project so the city would end up giving the money back. Impact fees should be used as a last resort. If a city has cash, they are supposed to spend this first, before using impact fees. They can't be spent on operations or maintenance. Since there may not be any more subdivisions in River Heights, it will be difficult to find a place to spend one or two person's impact fees. Someone from the League gave the class and could give a more detailed explanation.

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<u>Public Comment:</u> Bethany, a prevention educator from CAPSA, explained that April is sexual assault awareness month. Utah's numbers for this kind of abuse are higher than the national rate. CAPSA supports survivors of assault. She encouraged the group to be believers of those who say they

have been sexually assaulted. It's more prevalent than people realize. She guessed they helped about 1500 victims last year.

Councilmembers Clausen and Wright and Mayor Rasmussen won't be able to attend council meeting on the 26th. There was also a conflict on April 9. It was decided to move the meetings to Monday, March 25 and Thursday April 11th, both at 5:30.

Mayor Rasmussen appointed Councilmember Clausen as mayor pro tem until the end of the year. The others agreed.

Mayor Rasmussen asked Councilmember Thatcher if she's been able to find any grants the city could apply for to help restore the Old Church. Ms. Thatcher said she has not been able to find anything substantial.

Mayor Rasmussen asked for thoughts on the Old Church; should the city sell it to someone who is going to improve and develop it (which would bring in sale money and yearly property taxes)? Or, do we hold onto the property, put money into it and then sell it? He asked what they felt the residents of River Heights would value most? Councilmember Thatcher thinks they are very diverse. Councilmember Scott felt people would not want the city to have the liability. Ms. Thatcher didn't agree. PWD Nelson felt it comes down to cost.

Mayor Rasmussen asked what they value in the property? He values a quiet semi-open space. It could come as a renovation with low traffic, or an empty lot with grass. Councilmember Clausen expressed worry about the city's money and felt this would also be a concern to residents.

PWD Nelson suggested sometimes less is more. The less assets the city has, the better equipped they would be to keep them nice.

Councilmember Wilson didn't think it would look nice with Tony Johnson's plan. Eight apartments and 2.5 cars per residence is a lot of cars. Mayor Rasmussen reported there are currently about 100 parking spaces.

Councilmember Thatcher said the history is important. She wants to preserve the architecture and its esthetic quality and feels residential is the best use.

Councilmember Scott wants more open and green space. He doesn't see any historical value in the building, but sees it rather as a money pit. Councilmember Thatcher would like the city to sell it to Tony Johnson and suggested he would be willing to take them on a tour of the other places he has renovated.

Mayor Rasmussen guessed their opinions represent the citizens' opinions. He will try to find an example of an older, restored building somewhere else in a similar demographic.

PWD Nelson felt the building should be put out for bid.

Councilmember Scott asked if we had an appraisal. Mayor Rasmussen guessed it was worth about \$200,000, which Mr. Johnson is willing to pay. From a business view it makes sense to sell it outright.

Councilmember Clausen asked the mayor to report on his meeting with Michael Ballam. Mayor Rasmussen answered that Mr. Ballam told him how important the Old Church was to the Opera Company and if they didn't have it they may need to shut down. The mayor told him it's not fair that River Heights' residents pay for his storage building. Mr. Ballam asked if the city could give him an option with the Old School. Mayor Rasmussen said they might be able to rent a couple classrooms, which Mr. Ballam said would be fine. They need a 15'x30' space to paint back drops. PWD Nelson found out the Opera Company has about 50 storage units around town.

Mayor Rasmussen said the school district plans to move out of the Old School by June of this year. The District is willing to keep it for a year or two or the city can take it over right away. The Council will discuss it at an upcoming meeting.

The meeting adjourned at 7:45 p.m.
